ouses are only as unique as the people who live in them. And in the case of this four-bedroom home in Toronto, "unique" feels like an understatement. The owner - and visionary behind its eclectic look — is Betsy Aziz, a lawyer who recently became certified as a Master Food Preserver and can often be found making batches of preserves on her eight-burner stove. So it's hardly a surprise that when Betsy and her husband, Andrew, decided to build their dream home four years ago, they spent weeks interviewing builders and designers who would understand their unique style: a combination of their appreciation for exotic travel and contemporary architecture. They eventually hired Toronto architect Richard Wengle and interior designer Connie Braemer. "Richard and Connie were prepared to work toward what we wanted, and listened to us so we knew we wouldn't get a cookie-cutter approach," says Betsy.

Thirteen months after the first shovel broke ground, the couple and their two teenage sons (along with their Boston terrier, Dolly) moved into the new 4,300-square-foot home. The house incorporates every element on their wish list. The yellow-brick Regency façade fits in perfectly with the Georgian architecture in their upscale neighbourhood. Inside, the gracious rooms are traditional, to be sure. Yet Braemer approached each element with an innovative twist: the living room's coffered ceiling is set on a 45-degree angle for added visual interest, and in the kitchen, distressed Shaker-style cabinets are paired with industrial fixtures and appliances.
